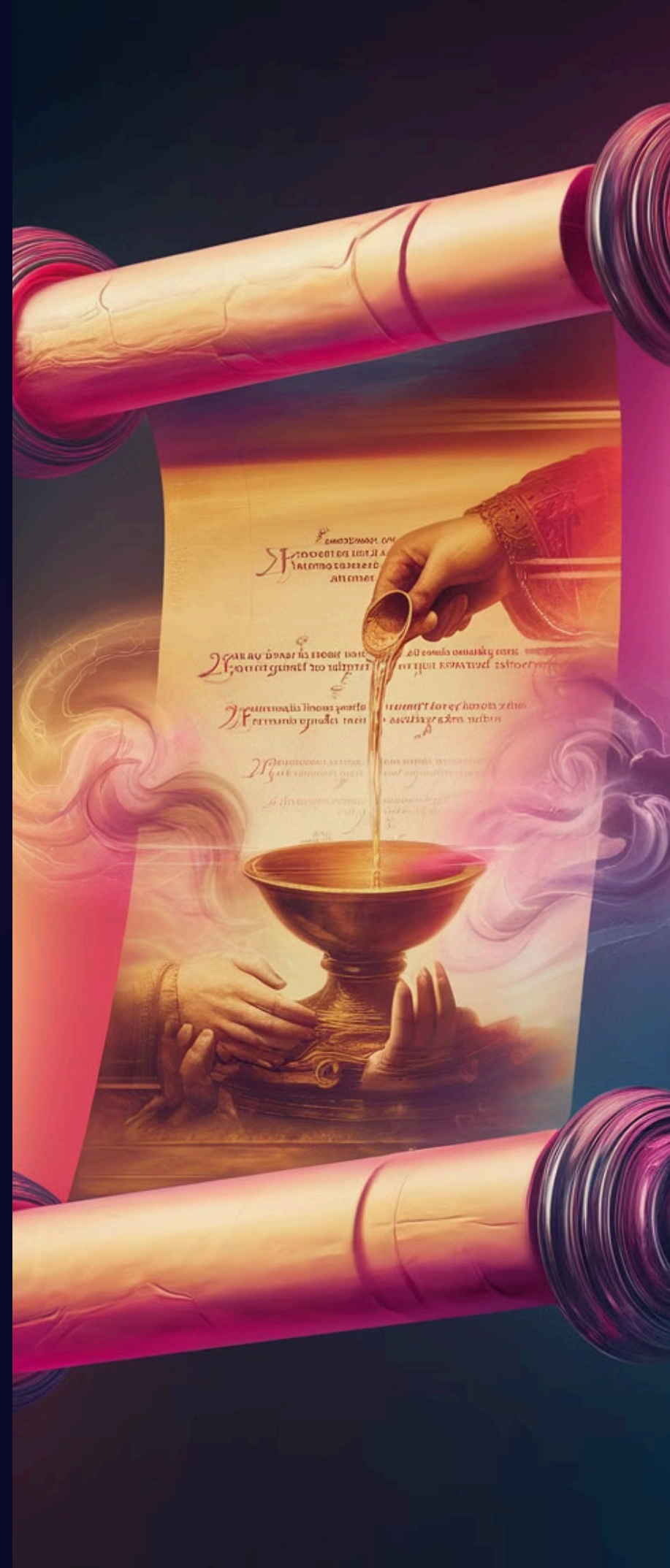


Revelation Chapter 16: The Bowls of God's Wrath

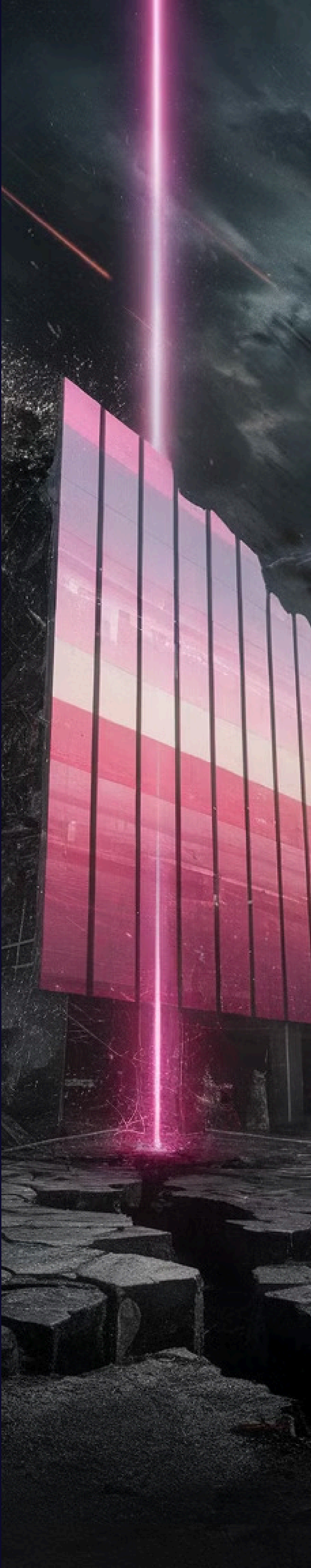

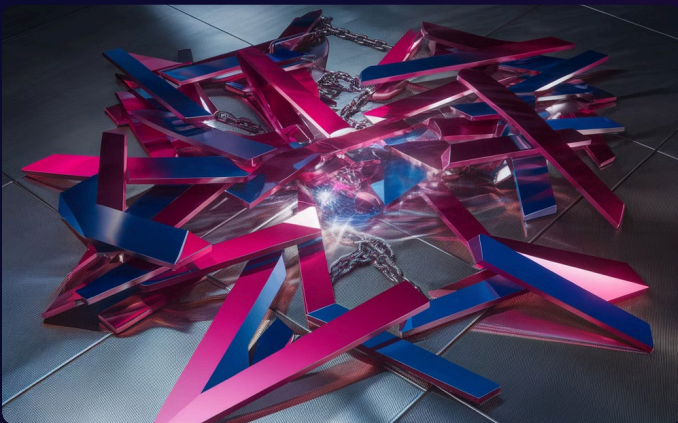
